

FROM THE DIRECTOR

The Community Cottage is on its way!!!

Last week the Board of Trustees approved a Parent Community Council (PCC) proposal to transform the current clay studio into a Community Cottage. The idea is that the building will be renovated and beautified this summer. Then, beginning next fall, the PCC will schedule community use in the building every day up until 11 a.m. The Faculty and PCC will work out the use of the building each day after 11 a.m. The Board will complete all work on the exterior of the building, including jacking it up and working on the foundation, replacing the roof, repairing and replacing trim, and building an entry porch. Mark Ferrero will do the work beginning June 14th and will complete it by June 25th. The PCC will take care of beautifying the interior of the building and will have the green light to begin work as soon as Mark has finished working on the foundation.

This is a very exciting project that will finally give our parental community a physical space to initiate activities from. It also will be wonderful that the first view of our campus will include an attractive building. It is wonderful when the PCC, the Faculty, and the Board come together to create something together. This is a moment when we get to see the social motto, that both the administration and the Board begins and closes each of their meetings with, in action:

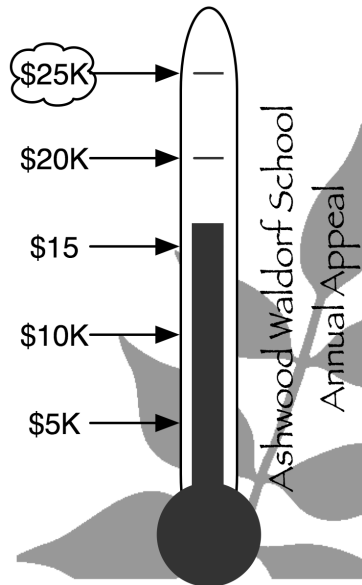

DRIVEWAY UPDATE

A while back I wrote to you regarding the condition of our driveway. Since that time the Strategic Planning Committee (SPC) has directed a lot of energy towards finding a cost effective long-term solution. The SPC consulted with Gartley & Dorsky Engineering and Surveying to develop a plan that addressed both the flow of water and the overall grade of the driveway.

Using this plan we solicited bids from several excavation companies. I am pleased report that beginning on June 14th, Lamont Excavations will be on site to put our plan into action. Through the use of a fabric barrier, and the addition of nearly one foot of gravel base material, we expect to eliminate the frost heaves and ruts that have troubled us for so long. In addition, we will pave the driveway from Park Street to just around the bend by the large pine tree. The remaining road surface will be of reclaimed asphalt placed on top of the aforementioned gravel bed. It is our hope that this work will result in a driveway that requires little to no maintenance for years to come. I want to thank each one of you for your patience with this process.

A Puff of Blue Smoke

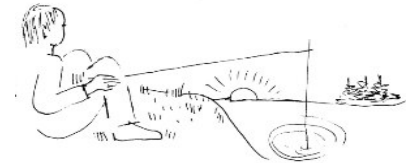

This will be the second year of transitioning the field to organic certification, which will take one more year. Last year the berries sold out, so please get your orders in soon. We offer 10-pound boxes of fresh, sorted, and cleaned berries. Keep some fresh, and freeze the rest to enjoy year round. We will have staggered pick-up dates at our farm in Lincolnville (just off Moody Mountain Road) in July and August. We will be in touch with more specifics once the harvest dates become clearer. The prices are \$28 for a 10-pound box or \$25 each for three or more boxes.
