

FROM THE DIRECTOR

As warm weather wanes and the flu season is on the horizon, I would like to remind the whole community of Ashwood's health policies. I am asking families to be vigilant in following the part of the policy requesting that you keep your child at home for at least 24 hours after the child shows no symptoms of illness. The Center for Disease Control is recommending the following guidelines on this topic:

"(CDC) recommends that, based on current flu conditions, students and staff with flu-like illness stay home until at least 24 hours after they no longer have a fever or signs of a fever. This should be determined without the use of fever-reducing medications (any medicine that contains ibuprofen or acetaminophen). This is a shorter time period from the previous guidance which recommended that sick students and staff stay home 7 days after symptoms begin. The 7-day period away from school for sick students and staff would still be recommended under more severe flu conditions."

If we all follow these simple guidelines we will be doing our part to minimize the impact of illnesses within the school community. Other than this request, it is up to each family to decide how to respond to illnesses. As a school, we fully respect that each family has its own style of coping with sickness. I do ask that you let me know if your child displays flu-like symptoms so that we stay alert and may respond to health concerns as they emerge.

GRADE SCHOOL EXTENDED DAY PROGRAM OFFERED

This year, for the first time, Ashwood is able to offer after-school childcare for our grade-school students. There are a limited number of openings available for grade-school students to attend the Extended Day Program at the Early Childhood Center.

Jean Moss, our incredibly gifted and experienced Extended Day teacher, has happily agreed to expand the program to include grade-school students. The program will run from 3:15 until 4:15 p.m. Students will be invited to participate in relaxing, quiet indoor activities such as drawing or completing homework assignments, or playing outdoors. There will be no structured activities offered. This is not a drop-in program; parents must sign up their children in advance. Children may attend one to five afternoons per week. We do, however, offer drop-in care on an emergency basis for unanticipated occurrences when the parent is unexpectedly late or circumstances arise that do not allow the parent to pick up their child at dismissal. In such cases, teachers will remain with students from dismissal time at 3:15 until 3:30. Any student who is still at school at 3:30 will be brought to the Extended Day Program by the teacher on duty. If you are interested in signing up for the Extended Day Program, or would like to receive a fee schedule for grade-school students, please call the school office.

PARENT-TEACHER CONFERENCES

Have you signed up for your conference(s) yet? Sign-up sheets are in the office; please stop in or call Lauren at 236-8021 to schedule a conference. The conferences begin after dismissal (1:30-5:50 p.m.) on Thursday, Nov. 5th, and continue from 8:30 a.m.-3:55 p.m. on Friday, Nov. 6th (there is **no school on Friday**). Additional times are available for the Early Childhood and Sixth Grade to accommodate these larger classes. We ask families with two households to be sure to schedule just one parent-teacher conference; this ensures the best communication possible and allows the teachers to meet with all the parents in their class during the scheduled meeting days. Parents are asked to arrive promptly and limit the conference to the scheduled time. **Please remember that no children may be on campus without adult supervision during parent-teacher conferences.** Thank you!

HOW ARE WE PAYING FOR OUR NEW SCHOOL?

Even though our new school building is standing proud and beautiful, we are not finished raising the money to pay for it. I am sure you all know that The Fran and Warren Rupp Foundation provided an incredibly generous gift of \$250,000, but did you also know that the rest of the gifts have come from families, friends, and other foundations and businesses within our community? So far, Ashwood has received:

- 1 gift for \$250,000
- 1 gift for \$50,000
- 1 gift for \$40,000
- 4 gifts for \$25,000
- 4 gifts for \$10,000
- 1 gift for \$9,000
- 2 gifts for \$7,500
- 7 gifts for \$5,000
- 3 gifts for \$3,000
- 46 gifts for \$2,000 and under

The total amount of these gifts to date is \$581,000! That figure is truly amazing considering we launched the campaign during the worst recession since the Great Depression. Thank you to all who have dug so deep and stretched your budgets to help build our school.

But our work is not done yet. We still need to raise \$169,000 to reach our goal of \$750,000.

The Next Step

The Campaign Cabinet, which currently consists of Richard Ailes, Kim Cobourn, Betsy Morrell, and Jody Spanglet, is still doing solicitations, but we are wrapping up the face-to-face meetings. We are about to launch the telephone solicitation part of the campaign. If you have yet to be solicited, you will be receiving a call within the next few weeks, and you will be asked to help support this project.

Please start thinking of how you may be able to help. A gift for as little as \$5 a month for five years will contribute \$300 toward Ashwood's goal, \$10 a month would be \$600, and \$25 a month would be \$1,500 over five years. We offer payroll deduction plans or direct deposit from your checking account to make pledging as easy as possible. You can also donate online at Ashwood's website. Remember, your gift can be spread over a five-year period and can begin and end at any time that works for you. Think about your financial situation and how it may change over the next few years. Be creative! Every gift counts.

THE SPIRITS OF HALLOWEEN

Eons ago, as they looked upon the mists that wove around their fjords and heaths, ancient Europeans had a particular experience as the days grew shorter. Toward the end of the month that we call October, they perceived the souls of all of those who had died in the past year gathering and preparing to ascend to their heavenly home, making a space for the souls due to be born in the year to come. But before they could assume their place in the ethereal realm, the departed souls had to sweep away all the detritus of the life just past and cast it to the earth. Thus the popular image of witches riding on their broomsticks is a misperception: in reality, the brooms are sweeping away the witches!

At the time when the child is in fourth-grade, a sense of human mortality begins to dawn within her. Children of this age are rightfully and healthily drawn to all of the frightful and gruesome aspects of Halloween, and they look forward with trembling anticipation to visiting a haunted house, watching an horrific form arise out of a swamp, or, if only through a well-told story, being scared out of their senses!

For the younger child, however, the situation is different. The spirits and creatures with whom the younger child communes are *not* those created by

human error, but rather those in whom the innocent and wise powers of Nature reside: gnomes and undines, fairies and elves, the spirits of stones and streams, sun and wind. For young children to be exposed only to the dark and demonic qualities of Halloween is to deny the unspoken conviction that they carry in their souls that *the world is good*.

Ashwood Waldorf School Health Policy

Because Waldorf education is concerned with the whole child and finds a relationship between health and learning, you will find your child's teacher receptive to any comments you wish to share about your child's health, illnesses past and present, sleeping and eating habits, stresses, and home-life rhythms.

Any child who is ill with an infectious or contagious condition must not be brought to school until the end of the infectious phase. If there is some question about your child's state of health, it is often better to keep your child at home. If your child is ill and will not be attending school, please call the office at 236-8021 and leave a message by 8 a.m.

We suggest that parents give their children at least one full day of rest at home after an illness. We ask that your child be fever-free for at least 24 hours before returning to school. When the child is well enough to do some work at home, parents of children in grades 4-8 should contact the class teacher to arrange for assignments to be sent.

If the onset of illness occurs during school hours, the school office will contact the parents to arrange for their child to go home. If a child receives a minor injury during school hours, he or she will be sent to the office for first aid as needed. When a child receives significant first aid, an injury report will be filed in the office and the parent will be contacted.

Communicable Diseases

Teachers will send to the office students who, during the school day, develop any symptoms that suggest illness:


- Unusual listlessness
- Excessively red or draining eyes
- Skin rash
- Persistent cough
- Persistent nausea, with or without vomiting
- Diarrhea
- Persistent headache, stomachache, or sore throat
- Elevated temperature

Parents will be notified by phone of their child's illness and asked to make arrangements to have their child picked up from school.

Students with the following communicable diseases will be excluded for the time periods stated below.

- Impetigo: There must be no draining lesions, and the child must have received 24 hours of treatment.
- Head Lice: The child must be free of all lice and eggs before returning; treatment alone is not sufficient for re-entry. The child's head will be checked before the child may return to class. All blankets, pillows, and articles of clothing that may have been exposed to lice should be taken home and washed thoroughly.
- Scabies: The child must stay home until at least 24 hours after treatment has begun.
- Strep Throat/Scarlet Fever: Child is to have 24 hours of antibiotics or equivalent treatment before returning to school.
- Chicken Pox: The child will be excluded from school until all lesions are crusted over and no new lesions have developed for 24 hours.
- Ringworm: The child will be excluded until treatment has been started.
- Conjunctivitis: The child is to have 24 hours of treatment before returning to school.
- Mumps: The child must stay home until he or she is without fever for 24 hours, and all facial swelling has resolved.
- Measles: The child must stay home until he or she is without fever for 24 hours and the rash has resolved.
